## The Date of Pascha

Have you ever wondered why Eastern Orthodox Christians don't always celebrate Pascha on the same day as everyone else? There are many urban legends within Orthodoxy as to why this is. But in this post, we explain the real reason we celebrate Pascha later than the rest of Christianity. Buckle up – this gets interesting!

## THE URBAN LEGENDS

According to the traditional formula for the date of Pascha, we should celebrate it on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. There are three main legends that circulate in the Orthodox world to explain why this is:

- #1 Pascha must always come after the Jewish Passover.
- #2 Even with both the Old and New calendars, all Orthodox celebrate Pascha on the same day.
- #3 Kyriopascha can never happen on the New calendar.

Let's take a look at each of these one at a time and clear up misconceptions surrounding these legends. Then we'll explain why the Eastern and Western Paschal dates are different.

## #1: PASCHA MUST ALWAYS COME AFTER PASSOVER

This urban legend is quite old, originating somewhere around the 12th century. Canonist John Zonaras appears to have been the genesis of this legend, with his misguided interpretation of Apostolic Canon 7. This canon essentially states that bishops and presbyters who celebrate Pascha before the vernal equinox are to be deposed. Zonaras concluded the following from this canon:

- 1. We must celebrate Pascha after the vernal equinox.
- 2. Pascha must never coincide with Jewish Passover.

This second conclusion may have stemmed from the rule from the Council of Nicea, which stated the calculation of the date of Pascha was not to go along "with the Jews". In other words, the date of Pascha would not have any dependence on the Jewish calendar whatsoever. Zonaras very well may have misinterpreted this and feared that if Passover coincided with an independently-determined Pascha, Christians would be wrongfully praying "with the Jews" just because both are praying on the same day. Zonaras was obviously incorrect. By his time, the errors in the Julian calendar accumulated to the degree that Pascha did, in fact, always follow Jewish Nisan 15 (the first day of Passover). This continues to the present day, so it makes sense why the urban legend still survives in certain Orthodox circles.

It is also important to remember that Passover does not last just one day. And therefore, Orthodox Pascha could not always have been after Passover. Otherwise we would be breaking our own canons! For example, in 2014, we celebrated Pascha on April 20, while Passover began April 14 (evening) and ended April 22 (morning). Something similar happened in 2001, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2008, 2010, 2011, and 2017.

## #2: ALL ORTHODOX CELEBRATE PASCHA ON THE SAME DAY

Most Orthodox do celebrate Pascha on the same day. However, the Orthodox Church of Finland actually celebrates according to the updated Gregorian Calendar, which puts their Pascha on the same day as Western Easter every single year. Additionally, if you want to include the Oriental Orthodox here, note that most Armenians and the Malankara church in India follow the Gregorian Paschalion as well. The Coptic, Armenian (Jerusalem Patriarchate), Syriac, Ethiopian and Eritrean churches, however, do not.

### #3: KYRIOPASCHA CAN NEVER HAPPEN ON THE NEW CALENDAR

This is the final urban legend we see surrounding the celebration of Orthodox Pascha. Kyriopascha occurs when the Annunciation (March 25) and Pascha coincide. This happens once every several decades on the Old/Julian calendar that most Orthodox in the world follow. (It happened last in 1991. The next time will be 2075.) Those who celebrate on the Revised Julian/New calendar can never celebrate Kyriopascha, because this calendar still uses the Julian Paschalion, just as the Old calendar does. Therefore, Pascha can never fall as early as March 25th on this calendar. However, we cannot leave out our brethren in Finland, who use the Gregorian Paschalion that came with the Gregorian calendar (used in most Western Christian churches). Therefore, they celebrate Kyriopascha, too, though they celebrate it when the West would, not when we would on the Old calendar.

### DETERMINING THE DATE OF PASCHA

While the dating of Pascha is of course related to Passover because the formula puts Pascha around the same time as Passover, Pascha is no longer dependent on Passover (cf. First Ecumenical Council). The Orthodox Church follows the rules set forth at the First Ecumenical Council when calculating the date of Pascha. While this formula can get rather complex, we've tried to simplify it a bit: we celebrate Pascha the Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox.

Over time, our mathematical cycles predicting the equinox and full moon drifted. The Orthodox Church never updated these cycle calculations, whereas the West did, in 1582 under Pope Gregory XIII. Pope Gregory commissioned a reform of the Julian calendar. He named this new calendar after himself; hence, the Gregorian calendar. Astronomers of the time asserted these reforms corrected the issues found within the Julian calendar. Eventually, it became internationally accepted in Western Christianity and in secular society. This is why the West and East celebrate feast days on different dates; the Orthodox celebrations always fell thirteen days behind those of Western churches.

## WHY ARE THE DATES OF ALL OTHER FEASTS (CHRISTMAS, EPIPHANY, ETC.) THE SAME?

To answer this question, we need to go back to the three different calendar versions used in the Christian world. First, we have the Old (Julian) calendar, which follows the Julian Paschalion. Then, we have the New (Revised Julian) calendar, which made revisions to date calculations for everything except Pascha. In other words, it's basically the Gregorian calendar with the Julian Paschalion. Finally, you have the Gregorian calendar, which follows its own Paschalion.

Any churches using the Revised Julian calendar (most Orthodox churches these days) or the Gregorian calendar (Catholics and Protestants) will celebrate most feast days at the same times. But because the Revised Julian calendar and the Gregorian calendar use different Paschalions, the date of Pascha and any of the feast days dependent on this date (like the Ascension and Pentecost) will also be different.

Some jurisdictions of the Orthodox Church (e.g., Serbian, Russian) adhere to the Old calendar and thus celebrate every feast day on a different date than Western Christians.

## **WHAT**

The Mediterranean Festival is the primary fundraiser for our parish, and helps us **meet the financial needs of our vibrant ministries** while also allowing us **to serve others** by donating a portion of our proceeds to local charities. The Festival is also a public outreach event which helps us **share our faith and our founding heritage** with the community. - Grilled Plate (\$16): Kafta with Pita and Sour Cream Sauce, Lebanese Chicken Kebab with Rice, Greek Salad
- Dessert Sampler Plate (\$5): 1 Traditional Baklawa, 1 Chocolate Baklawa Stick, 1 Greek Cookie

## PRESALE TICKETS ARE \$16

One ticket = one plated meal. Tickets can be used for Drive-Thru, Carry-Out, or in the Marketplace. We encourage everyone to take some tickets to try and sell. While tickets are not required (we accept cash, check, credit card, and pre-sale tickets), tickets help get people in the door and usually lead to additional purchases, especially in the Marketplace. Every year we also have a significant number of unredeemed tickets, which is pure profit for us. Tickets, trifolds, and posters will be available every Sunday, or by talking to a member of the festival committee.

## MEDITERRANEAN MARKETPLACE WILL BE OPEN

The Mediterranean Marketplace remains our biggest opportunity for growth in revenue and every year we run out of items. **Everyone's participation is needed by making baked goods!** We can't stress this enough, and when everyone pitches in it makes a huge impact on our offering as well as our income. ### **MEAL TRAIN**



The St Mary Meal Train ministry was formed in 2016 to serve the families in our parish immediately following the birth of a child. After the birth of a child, what to eat for dinner is not usually at the forefront of new parents' minds. Instead, new parents are focused on the new life they have created and finding their new normal between dirty diapers, seemingly near-constant cries, and many feedings.

Our goal is to provide the evening meal every day for a week. The meals have been a mixture of home cooked, frozen, and store-bought meals as well as restaurant gift cards. We also provide a supply of paper products such as plates, napkins, cutlery, and cups to reduce the workload of the family. Being part of this ministry does not mean that you have to be involved every time a request is sent out. Each of us has our own commitments and are sometimes unable to help. Any help at all is much appreciated by the families we are serving. If you would like to be part of this ministry, please contact Jessica Lessman (Miriam121406@ live.com) to get on the mailing list.

The Lord's Diner exists to combat hunger in the community. The Diner's singular mission is to serve a nutritious meal with dignity and respect to anyone who is hungry. The Lord's Diner serves an evening meal 365 days a year. The Lord's Diner serves an average of 2,500 meals nightly at two dining facilities (one in downtown Wichita and one in catholic diocese of wichita south Wichita) and three food trucks (one in northwest Wichita, and one in southeast Wichita, and one in northeast Wichita) to any guest who needs a nutritious meal, 60 percent of which are families.

St. Mary volunteers serve at The Lord's Diner on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. We gather at the downtown location, Central and Broadway, at 5:15 p.m. We are usually finished by 8:00 p.m., so come join us. All volunteer sign up is now taking place on SIGN UP GENIUS. #### **Our Mission**

St. Mary Parish participates by hosting families in the program four times a year in our church building. Families arrive at St. Mary on Sunday in time for the evening meal. Parishioners volunteer their time by driving families to and from the day house, setting up the rooms, and sleeping overnight at the church. Evening meals, food for breakfast, and snacks are all provided by St. Mary parishioners. The families eat their evening meal and spend the night at the church. Lunches are made and snacks packed before heading to their rooms for the night. They get up and leave the church by 6:15 each morning and are transported to the day house. During the day, they work, attend classes, shower, do laundry, and a multitude of other tasks before returning to the church in time for the evening meal. Both the families and parishioners are encouraged and blessed by the interactions throughout the week. Although approximately fifty parishioners participated in 2021, there is still a need for more to participate in this significant ministry by providing hospitality and shelter. ## **GREETER MINISTRY TEAM**




The primary purpose of the Greeter Ministry Team is to make all of our visitors to St. Mary feel welcome in our parish home. gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." To welcome the stranger is a great blessing to them and to us; the Greeter Ministry Team strives to fulfill this scriptural command together with our parish family. One responsibility of greeters is to greet visitors before Liturgy. This includes giving them a bulletin and visitor packet, asking them to sign the visitor book, and invite them to coffee hour. After Liturgy, greeters will seek out the visitors and introduce to at least one other person in church, introduce them to Fr. Aaron and Deacon James, offer to give a tour of the facility, and show them the rack of educational pamphlets in the foyer. During the following week, the greeter will complete a New Visitor Note Card that will be mailed to the visitor. There are currently six active members of the Greeters Team. # Cook's Corner

## Chicken Parmesan

## **Ingredients**

- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 2 large eggs
- 1 cup panko bread crumbs, or more as needed
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup grated Parmesan cheese, divided
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour, or more if needed
- ½ cup olive oil for frying, or as needed
- ½ cup prepared tomato sauce
- ¼ cup fresh mozzarella, cut into small cubes
- ½ cup chopped fresh basil
- ½ cup grated provolone cheese
- 2 teaspoons olive oil

## **Directions**

- **Step 1** Preheat an oven to 450 degrees F (230 degrees C).
- **Step 2** Place chicken breasts between two sheets of heavy plastic (resealable freezer bags work well) on a solid, level surface. Firmly pound chicken with the smooth side of a meat mallet to a thickness of 1/2-inch. Season chicken thoroughly with salt and pepper.
- **Step 3** Beat eggs in a shallow bowl and set aside.
- **Step 4** Mix bread crumbs and 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese in a separate bowl, set aside.
- **Step 5** Place flour in a sifter or strainer; sprinkle over chicken breasts, evenly coating both sides.
- **Step 6** Dip a flour-coated chicken breast in beaten eggs. Transfer breast to the bread crumb mixture, pressing crumbs into both sides. Repeat for each breast. Let chicken rest for 10 to 15 minutes.
- **Step 7** Heat 1/2 inch olive oil in a large skillet on medium-high heat until it begins to shimmer. Cook chicken in the hot oil until golden, about 2 minutes per side. The chicken will finish cooking in the oven.
- **Step 8** Transfer chicken to a baking dish. Top each breast with 2 tablespoons tomato sauce. Layer each chicken breast with equal amounts of mozzarella cheese, fresh basil, and provolone cheese. Sprinkle remaining Parmesan over top and drizzle each with 1/2 teaspoon olive oil.
- **Step 9** Bake in the preheated oven until cheese is browned and bubbly and chicken breasts are no longer pink in the center, 15 to 20 minutes. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read at least 165 degrees F (74 degrees C).
