Synaxarion for the Sunday of Pascha By Nikephoros Kallistos Xanthopoulos

We call the present Feast "Pascha", which means "Passover" in the Hebrew language; for this is the day on which God originally brought the world into existence from non-being. It was on this day that He conveyed the people of Israel across the Red Sea and snatched them out of the hands of Pharaoh; on this day also, descending from Heaven, He came to dwell in the Virgin's womb. And now, after snatching the whole of mankind from the depths of Hades, He has raised it up to Heaven and restored to it the ancient dignity of incorruption. But when He descended to Hades, He did not resurrect all, but only those who chose to believe in Him. He freed the souls of the Saints from all the ages who were being forcibly held by Hades, and allowed all of them to ascend to Heaven. For this reason, rejoicing exceedingly, we celebrate the Resurrection with splendor, offering an image of the joy in which our nature abounds through the tender mercy of God. Likewise, demonstrating the destruction of enmity and our unity with God and the Angels themselves, we give each other the customary kiss of peace.

The Resurrection of the Lord took place in this manner. While the soldiers were guarding the tomb, around the middle of the night an earthquake occurred; for an Angel came down and removed the stone from the door of the sepulchre. On beholding this, the guards fled, and thus the women were afforded their opportunity at the end of the Sabbath, that is, around the middle of Saturday night. The Resurrection was made known first to the Mother of God, who sat opposite the tomb with Mary Magdalene, as St. Matthew says. But in order that the Resurrection should not be a matter of doubt, on account of the familiarity of the Lord's Mother, the Evangelists say: He appeared first to Mary Magdalene. It was she who saw the Angel on the stone and, stooping down to look, saw the Angels inside the tomb; these Angels announced the Resurrection of the Lord. For "He is risen", they said, "He is not here; behold the place where they laid Him." Therefore, on hearing these words, she ran to the most ardent among the Disciples, Peter and John, and told them the glad tidings of the Resurrection. As she was returning with Mary, Christ encountered them, saying: "Rejoice!" For it was fitting that the sex which first heard the words, "in pain thou shalt bring forth children," should be the first to hear this joy. Overcome with love, they approached and touched His immaculate feet, wishing to recognize Him more precisely. The Apostles came to the tomb; and Peter stooped down to look inside the tomb and departed, while John went inside and looked more searchingly, and touched the linen clothes and the napkin.

Mary Magdalene returned with other women at dawn so as to confirm with greater certainty what had been seen. Standing outside, she lamented, but when she stooped to look inside the tomb, she saw two Angels shining with radiance, reproving her, as it were, and saying: "Lady, why weepest thou, whom seekest thou? Seek ye Jesus of Nazareth, Who was crucified? He is risen; He is not here." And at once they arose in fear, seeing the Lord. Turning round, she saw Christ standing; thinking Him to be the gardener (for the tomb was in a garden), she said: "Sir, if thou hast borne Him hence, tell me where thou hast laid Him, and I will take Him away." When she beckoned again to the Angels, the Savior said to Magdalene: "Mary." And she, perceiving the sweet and familiar voice of Christ, wanted to touch Him. But He said: "Touch Me not; for I am not yet ascended to My Father, as thou thyself dost reason, still supposing Me to be a man; but go to My brethren, and tell them all that thou hast seen and heard." Magdalene did this. As day dawned again, she came to the tomb with the other women.

Those who were with John and Salome arrived at sunrise; and, to put it simply, the women came to the tomb in different groups, among them being the Theotokos; for she is the one whom the Gospel calls Mary, the mother of Joses; this Joses was a son of Joseph. It is, however, unclear at what hour the Lord arose: some say that it was at the first cockcrow, others that it was when the earthquake occurred, and others suggest different times.

After these events, some of the guards went and reported to the high priests what had happened; the latter, putting money in their hands, persuaded them to say that Christ's Disciples had come by night and stolen Him. In the evening of the same day, when the Disciples had gathered to-gether through fear of the Jews and the doors were securely shut, Christ came to them—for His body was incorrupt—and greeted them with the customary greeting, "Peace." On seeing Him, they rejoiced exceedingly, and when Christ breathed on them they received the energy of the All-holy Spirit more perfectly.

This is how the Lord's Resurrection took place on the third day. The evening of Thursday and the day of Friday (for this is how the Hebrews measure the period of twenty-four hours) are one day. The night of Friday and the whole of Saturday are another period of twenty-four hours; this is the second day. The night of Saturday and the day of Sunday are another period of twenty-four hours; this is the third day.

To Him be glory and dominion unto the ages of ages. Amen.

DRIVE-THRU & CARRY-OUT

The format this year is the same as last year, which is a drive-thru and carry-out only, plus the Mediterranean Marketplace inside. There is no indoor or outdoor seating.

PLATED MEAL - HONORING OUR ROOTS

We are returning to our roots with a single traditional plate that is nearly identical to our earliest known menu (pictured in graphic above) which features St Mary's most popular and well-known menu items:

Greek Salad, Rice & Green Beans, 2 Cabbage Rolls, Kibbee, Talame Bread, Baklawa

The plated meal costs \$20 and can be purchased the day of the event with cash, credit card, or pre-sale tickets in the drive-thru or carry-out.

MEDITERRANEAN MARKETPLACE

The Mediterranean Marketplace remains St. Mary's biggest opportunity for growth in revenue, and every year we run out of items. **Everyone's participation is needed by making baked goods!** This is so important! When everyone pitches in, it makes a huge impact on St. Mary's offering as well as income. Ethnic foods are wonderful, but all baked goods sell. PRESALE TICKETS

While tickets are not required to attend or make purchases at the event (cash, check, credit card, and pre-sale tickets are accepted.), tickets help get people in the door and usually lead to additional purchases, especially in the Marketplace. Every year there are a significant number of unredeemed tickets, which is pure profit for St. Mary. Tickets and marketing materials are available late March. Tickets can be used for drive-thru, carry-out, or in the Marketplace. Please make sure to take some to sell!!

CHARITY PARTNER

The bookstore is open, the church is open for tours, our charity partner has an information table, and there is a raffle for a gift basket.

Family Promise of Greater Wichita unites hearts and hands to provide compassionate hospitality and empower homeless families with children to achieve sustainable independence.

Our Uniqueness

Our customized case management allows us to walk beside families in life, partnering with them to achieve their goals. This allows high-quality, high-impact care. There are three phases to our Sustainable Independence Program (SIP):

Phase 1: Support Services

Families are assisted with urgent/crisis needs for homelessness prevention, as we have resources.

Phase 2: Hospitality/Lodging

Our Rotation Program, to work towards sustainability. Other programs revolve around this. St. Mary recently completed a week of hosting families. Two families, two adults and eight children were provided nightly shelter and food for three meals a day. Approximately twenty volunteers came together to provide food, meals, transportation, laundry, or slept over at the church. Our remaining host weeks in 2023 are June 11 and December 24.

Phase 3: Mentoring/Aftercare

For families who have participated in/graduated from our Rotation Program.

GREETER MINISTRY TEAM

The primary purpose of the Greeter Ministry Team is to make all of our visitors to St. Mary feel welcome in our parish home. To welcome the stranger is not just a nice or courteous thing to do, but is in fact one of the things mentioned by our

Lord by which we will be judged: "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." To welcome the stranger is a great blessing to them and to us; the Greeter Ministry Team strives to fulfill this scriptural command together with our parish family. One responsibility of greeters is to greet visitors before Liturgy. This includes giving them a bulletin and visitor packet, asking them to sign the visitor book, and invite them to coffee hour. After Liturgy, greeters will seek out the visitors and introduce to at least one other person in church, introduce them to Fr. Aaron and Deacon James, offer to give a tour of the facility, and show them the rack of educational pamphlets in the foyer. During the following week, the greeter will complete a New Visitor Note Card that will be mailed to the visitor. There are currently six active members of the Greeters Team. MEAL TRAIN



AIN The St Mary Meal Train ministry was formed in 2016 to serve the families in our parish immediately following the birth of a child. After the birth of a child, what to eat for dinner is not usually at the forefront of new parents' minds. Instead, new parents are focused on the new life they have created and finding their new normal between dirty diapers, seemingly near-constant cries, and many feedings. Our goal is to provide the evening meal every day for a week. The meals have been a mixture of home cooked, frozen, and store-bought meals as well as restaurant gift cards. We also provide a supply of paper products such as plates, napkins, cutlery, and cups to reduce the workload of the family. Being part of this ministry does not mean that you have to be involved every time a request is sent out. Each of us has our own commitments and are sometimes unable to help. THE LORD'S DINER



The Lord's Diner exists to combat hunger in the community. The Diner's singular mission is to serve a nutritious meal with dignity and respect to anyone who is hungry. The Lord's Diner serves an evening meal 365 days a year. The Lord's Diner serves an average of 2,500 meals nightly at two dining facilities (one in downtown Wichita and one in south Wichita) and three food trucks (one in northwest Wichita, and one in southeast Wichita, and one in northeast Wichita) to any guest who needs a nutritious meal, 60 percent of which are families. St. Mary volunteers serve at The Lord's Diner on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. We gather at the downtown location, Central and Broadway, at 5:15 p.m. We are usually finished by 8:00 p.m., so come join us. This important ministry is in need of a new Team Leader. Cook's Corner



Sunday Pork Chops & Rice



Ingredients

- 1 (10.5-ounce) can cream of chicken soup
- 1 (10.5-ounce) can cream of mushroom soup
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 1/2 cups long grain rice, uncooked
- 1 packet dry onion soup mix
- 8 pork chops, boneless
- 1 tablespoon seasoned pepper

Directions

Step 1 - Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F.

Step 2 -Coat a 9x13-inch baking dish with cooking spray.

Step 3 -In a large bowl, combine the cream of chicken soup, the cream of mushroom soup, the chicken broth, the uncooked rice, and the onion soup mix.

Step 4 -Pour the rice mixture into the prepared baking dish.

Step 5 -On a large plate, season both sides of the pork chops with the seasoned pepper.

Step 6 -Place the seasoned pork chops on top of the rice mixture.

Step 7 -Bake the pork mixture, covered tightly with foil until the pork chops reach an internal temperature of 145 degrees F, about 1 hour 15 minutes-1 hour 30 minutes.

Step 8 - Serve.




